Patriots –Since 2005 over one rifle company has been lost to suicide. Let's put that in perspective, more than a rifle company over 200 Marines. That's a company of Marines that could have been fighting the enemy and killing the enemy, instead they took their own lives. For a period of time, here at Lejeune, every Battalion returning had a suicide. If you feel that you are having trouble coping, call the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline at 1-800-273-TALK (8255), a free, 24-hour hotline available to anyone in suicidal crisis or emotional distress. Don't be another non-combat statistic, life is too precious and you mean way too much to our chapter and your family.

Chapter Happenings

Has November and December been a busy period? I'd say so, this is our busiest season. We kicked off November with the Veterans Day parade, where for the first time along with the float we had 8 Purple Heart riders with us on their bikes. The full count for the parade was around 20 patriots, one of the best turn outs ever. After the parade and the next day we participated in a Veterans Expo in the mall. Our Americanism Team presented a couple classes to the area schools in conjunction with Veterans Day and we received a proclamation from Spanky's sports bar and grill on the Marine Corps Birthday. At our monthly meeting we quickly moved out of meeting business and into the celebration mode and proceeded with our holiday/MC Birthday party.



We had approximately 50 patriots and guests attend and all had a great time. At this party Kym Smith, Manager of the Carolina Ale House presented the chapter with a check pictured below representing 10% of the income for 21 October, the day of the Purple Heart dinner.



Also on 11 November, Veterans day, all the Ale Houses in five states will donate 10% of the income to the Purple Heart chapters in their respective areas. Last I heard from Kim this amounted to about \$13000. We have yet to receive a check


The next day we participated in a fundraiser at Lowes Food store on Gum Branch Road and it went quite well, so good that we have decided to hold our future Viola Drives at that location. The Manager and staff were very receptive.

Our Commander, Patriot Beck received the veteran of the year award for the Purple Heart from Mayor Sammy Phillips. The festival of trees followed later that week. This was our ninth year participating in this event and this year we modified our display from three trees to one tree. A couple meetings prior to the festival a committee volunteered to look into some changes due to the three trees being so crowded and it being such a task putting almost 600 breakable ornaments on the trees. As you can see by the Picture below we went to larger ornaments, one for each of the twelve years that the war has been going on. We put the year and the number of KIA's for that year in big bold numbers on each of the ornaments. Patriot Beck constructed a listing of all the KIAs by year on a poster board for placement on the table. This all went over quite well and we had many compliments on the change. Our Congrats to the Committee.



After the festival of trees we moved the Tree to the Main exchange on base where it remained until 2 January. It was manned daily on working days by

patriots and even some on weekends which amounted to some pretty good donations being received.





Meanwhile during this period of time Patriot Neil Lathrop passed away and he was laid to rest on 2 December in the state Veterans cemetery. Neil was a valued and active member of our chapter and the Finance officer for the Corpsmen Memorial Foundation. His passing is a blow to both organizations. RIP Brother Lathrop. Several patriots attended the Pearl Harbor Ceremony on 7 December. Patriot McGee was the MC for the event and did a fine Purple Heart job.

Twice a year the chapter is presented with a monetary amount to spend on veterans, this is called VAVS funds. This installment was \$1250, we spent just over half of it to help one of our chapter members with rent and utilities and the rest we spent on the VA nursing home in Kinston NC. On 11 December eight patriots went to Kinston with a load of 20 brand new Wheel Chairs, still in the boxes, procured by Patriot Walker and about \$500 worth of Health and comfort items. We have taken this VA nursing home under our wing, in the past we supported the VA nursing home in Fayetteville but since there is already a chapter in Fayetteville we decided to go this route.

And last but not least we presented plaques to the honor graduates of the Field Medical Training Battalion.

We start the year by tearing down our beautiful new tree on 2 January. At 0900 we will easily, compared to previous years, disassemble the tree and the twelve ornaments and store them away in our CONEX box until next year. COLA minus 1 percent

The plea to "wait for the commission" was used again in the authorization bill to delay adoption of a COLA-minus-1 percent formula aimed at dampening retirement costs of future members.

Congress last year replaced the pearl of cost-of-living full adjustments in retirement for members who entered service on or after Jan. 1, 2014. Their COLAs, 20 years hence, were to be set a percentage point below annual inflation. The new bill moves the date of that change to impact only members entering on or after Jan. 1, 2016, giving Congress time to meld this idea with commission recommendations for reshaping future retirement.

Thousands of career-minded personnel who first entered service after Jan. 1 last year just dodged a bullet that would have devalued their retirement benefit significantly.

Commissary funds restored

House and Senate conferees negotiating a package to fund the Department of Defense through September 2015 have protected commissary operations by restoring 90 percent of a planned \$100 million cut.

Once again lawmakers thwarted a costsaving initiative targeting military compensation and endorsed by the Joint Chiefs as a way to dampen personnel costs so more dollars can be spent on training, weapon buys and other readiness accounts being victimized by arbitrary "sequestration" cuts.

Only last week House and Senate conferees on a different bill, the 2015 defense authorization act, unveiled a deal to lower the Defense Commissary Agency annual \$1.3 billion budget to \$1.2 billion. DeCA said it could absorb the knock without impacting customer savings or services.

The military resale industry challenged that notion, saying a cut of more than seven percent inevitably would impact staffing and store hours.

This week conferees shaping a final defense appropriations bill that is part of a massive spending package for the entire federal government restored \$90 million of the commissary budget cut in the authorization bill.

"This essential funding ensures that DeCA...will continue delivering a core benefit of military compensation," said Patrick Nixon, president of the American Logistics Association. ALA represents manufacturers and vendors of products sold in military stores.

In rejecting almost every Defense Department proposal this year to hold down personnel costs, lawmakers said time after time that these changes should await the final report of the Military Compensation and Retirement Modernization Commission, due in February. Appropriators echoed that point in restoring commissary funding.

Obama Signs New Stolen Valor Act

President Obama on Monday signed into law the latest version of the Stolen Valor Act, which makes it a federal crime for people to pass themselves off as war heroes by wearing medals they didn't rightfully earn.

The legislation passed both houses of Congress with overwhelming majorities.

An earlier version, passed in 2005, was struck down in June 2012 when the Supreme Court ruled that lying about military heroics was constitutionally protected speech unless there was intent to gain some benefit or something of value by fraud.

The law signed Monday at the White House includes such a provision, making it illegal to make the claims with the intent to obtain money, property or other tangible benefits.

Veterans organizations were quick to applaud Congress and the President for acting quickly on the amended version of the law.

"I think this was necessary because people were using it to receive the benefits of decorations of valor, and they were getting monetary benefit from it," said John Stovall, director of national security and foreign relations for The American Legion. "That's why we supported the amended version, not to infringe on anyone's First Amendment rights but to protect the reputation and meaning of the decorations."
