Chapter Happenings

Patriots, we have just come off of two very busy months. November saw the Purple Heart riders escorting returning units back to their battalion areas to their families. Americanism classes were conducted for over 1000 students and scouts. Two Veterans Day parades, one in Jacksonville and the other in Greenville were attended. The Veterans Day ceremony was attended by members at the DAV and at the same time members attended a Purple Heart Memorial Dedication in Swansboro. Also a first responder's plaque was presented to the wife of Deputy Lewis in Nashville NC. Deputy Lewis was killed in the line of duty. The Festival of trees was attended again this year

and our three Fallen Warrior Trees were again on display. They were well received by both the staff of the Festival and the Public. After the festival the trees were moved to the exchange aboard Camp Lejeune where they remained until after New Years.

Patriot Dan Stov received accolades from the Mayor of Jacksonville for being our Veteran of the year and a standing ovation by all present. This is the first time that an active duty member has been selected for the award and he duly deserves it. He also received the veteran of the year award from the chapter at the December monthly meeting. The van continues to be of service transporting Patriot **Bob** Mathews to his Fayetteville appointments. We also attended a Memorial Service for 3/2 which was a last minute notification so therefore we could not present our engraved medallions to the next of kin of the KIAs. At the November monthly meeting we had a mini Marine Corps Birthday ceremony with cake cutting.

For three days members rang the bells for the Salvation Army outside of Sams taking two hour shifts. We attended a Quarterly NC Department meeting in Wilmington and attended the Pearl Harbor Ceremony at the American Legion.

Wreaths across America was also attended by the Purple Heart riders and other members of the chapter. Check writing for the Wounded Warrior Christmas Leave period took place with the National MOPH commander, Bill Hutton in attendance. Also the National Ladies Auxiliary President Barb Cherone was on hand as well as John Bircher National Public Relations director.

Defense Bill Passes: 2012 Military Pay, TRICARE, and More

After weeks of bickering over a provision dealing with detaining terrorism suspects, Congress finally sent the National Defense Authorization Act of 2012 to President Barack Obama for signature. According to reports the President is no longer threatening to veto the bill. This should finally end any concern over the proposed 2012 across the board military pay increase.

Many now feel the arguments over the section on the handling of detainees were largely based on misstatements. According to Politico, Senate Armed Services Committee Chairman, Carl Levin (D-MI) said, "Neither the Senate bill nor the conference report stablishes new authority to detain American citizens – or anybody else."

Although the proposed amount of the raise (1.6 percent) was never contested between the Senate and House versions of the bill, the battle over the detainee issue could have delayed the raise, which is now set to go into effect in January. http://militaryadvantage.military-com/2011/12/2012-military-pay-raise-early-a-done-deal/#ixzz1h5R7iuez

Federal Government Hiring of Vets at 20-Year High-

The Office of Personnel Management (OPM) announced Tuesday that the federal government had hired the highest percentage of veterans in more than 20 years during the past fiscal year. Veterans represented 28.5 percent of total federal hires in fiscal 2011, an

increase of 2.9 percent over fiscal 2010 and 4.5 percent over fiscal 2009, according to preliminary figures released by OPM.

The unemployment rate for Iraq- and Afghanistan-era veterans stands at 11.1 percent, according to the latest Labor Department numbers. The President's Council on Veterans Employment, established when President Obama signed an executive order in 2009 and includes representatives of 24 government agencies, is believed to have had a positive effect on the rate of veteran hiring in the federal government.

The Council was intended by the White House to transform the federal government into a model employer for America's veterans. In addition to establish annual veteran hiring goals, the Council met this Tuesday and approved a pilot program that commits each agency to hiring up to two previously homeless veterans.

The next day we met with General Miller and then the commanding officer of the Wounded Warrior Barracks. General Miller when confronted with some of the problems stated they are as good as done. The tour of the Wounded Warrior Barracks, was fantastic, and the Commander stated his view on some things of which I disagree. we were cordial. Then Commander Joe Houle met us at the Memorial Gardens and gave all concerned the tour of the various Memorials. On the way back to the Exchange to pick up my car. The National Commander stated that if we were not the most active and best chapters we were one of them. I told him of our plans for the future and how we have changed our goals for membership. from 500 by the May Department Convention in Raleigh to 600. We have a strong goal of being the second ranked chapter in the country in terms of personnel. We are really going to have a spread in the Purple Heart Magazine. So a Bravo Zulu, to all hands, and like I said before I am so proud to be the chapter commander, it was

worth giving up the job of Department Commander.

The only bad news that I have received is of the Ladies Auxiliary folding up and giving their charter back to the National. This is really bad news, and would like to remind all members that the Auxiliary has really been helpful to us, and if any wives want to be more actively involved now is the time to do so. President Lott and Vice President Nichols have done a wonderful job, but I know that they are really burnt out by the inaction of the other Auxiliary members. Please I wish some more members would step up to the plate. Friday we are also presenting the plaques to the class leaders of the Field Medical School and the CREST. Like I have said before our main reason we are there is to honor ALL of the corpsmen and the RP's for what they are going to do to our fellow Marines. Almost all of us wearing purple hearts have had our lives either saved or further injury was prevented by actions of our "Docs". Also while we have been working at the trees, everyday at least one child will point me out to their parents as one of the patriots who talked to them in their school. It is a good feeling that they remember what we tell them. For the future we will need help on the 2nd of January taking the trees down, and I want to thank all of my fellow patriots for helping, especially on some days when I was somewhere else. You are all the reason why this chapter is getting a reputation as one of the best and most active in the country.

Purple Heart Riders Association

The Purple Heart riders were formed about two years ago by a Chapter in New Hampshire. The organization was formed by Motor Cycle enthusiasts that wanted to have a riding group within the Purple Heart. They first went to the MOPH and requested to use the circular logo owned by the Order and were told that they could not use it and furthermore if it was worn as a group it would signify Purple Heart sponsorship and therefore liability, which they would not accept.

With that knowledge obtained from National, the New Hampshire chapter set out to establish a Purple Heart riding group with our own constitution and bylaws and in no way part of the Purple Heart Order other than the members must have a Purple Heart. There are Purple Heart Riders now in 34 states and the patch worn on the back of a black denim or leather vest is awesome and in my estimation far better looking that the Purple Heart logo.

Patriot John Cooney, Chapter 642 is the NC President for the association and 10 members to date from Jacksonville and one from Charlotte have signed on already in NC.

The inititial cost is \$80, which includes the patch and a \$10 annual dues. After getting the patch the dues are \$10 per year to primarily maintain the website. The website is:
