Patriots –Since 2005 over one rifle company has been lost to suicide. Let's put that in perspective, more than a rifle company over 200 Marines. That's a company of Marines that could have been fighting the enemy and killing the enemy, instead they took their own lives. For a period of time, here at Lejeune, every Battalion returning had a suicide. If you feel that you are having trouble coping, call the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline at 1-800-273-TALK (8255), a free, 24-hour hotline available to anyone in suicidal crisis or emotional distress. Don't be another non-combat statistic, life is too precious and you mean way too much to our chapter and your family.

November and December are our busiest months, beginning with the Veterans day Parade and moving on from there. For the November monthly meeting we held a brief opening and then moved right to the festivities. We had a good turnout for the party and it was enjoyed by all.

Another First Responders presentation to one of our County Commissioners, Paul Buchanan was honored with a plaque for wounds received while a JPD officer some time back, he also joined the chapter, he was wounded in Vietnam

Our Annual Festival of Trees took place from 1 to 3 December at the American legion. This was an enjoyable weekend we got to display our trees with over 580 KIA's names of them from the beginning of hostilities in Iraq. We moved the trees to the Main exchange aboard Lejeune on the 3rd. The trees will come down and go back into our CONEX box on 2 January at 0900. We need members out there to help us tear down in an orderly manner

Several patriots attended another Wounded Warrior honor night at the New Bern Country Club on 6 December. We had about 30 Wounded Warriors from the barracks attended and were honored, food and drink was provided. About \$94,000 was raised at this event for the Christmas Leave fund.

The Christmas Leave check signing went on 13 December with two more stragglers dates. In all about 250 Wounded warrior got help with leave money to go home for the holidays. The next evening 14 December, at Swyanyks lounge there was a dinner for the new National Purple Heart Commander, Patriot Bruce McKenty. The National Commander, National Historian and the National Chaplain all attended the check signing and the dinner.

The Purple Heart riders participated in Wreaths Across America (above) in December. Next year we will obtain wreaths and place them on the graves of our deceased Brothers and sisters. Patriot Clinger our chaplain/Welfare officer will get the names and a map of the grave locations this year. It would be a good idea if the ladies do this for the widow's graves.

We are still working on the placement of the Purple Heart monument at the Wounded Warriors barracks. JVC Patriot Grant Beck is lead on this project and has been in touch with Maj. Baines at the Barracks and in turn the Major has submitted the required paperwork to HQMC. The location has changed it seems that we cannot place the monument in the traffic circle so we have decided to put it near the picnic area in the rear of the barracks. We actually feel this to be a better location with more exposure.

As you can see by the Calendar of events, January and February haves slowed tremendously. There are some areas that we need to focus on, one being pushing along the placement of the Purple Heart Monument at the Wounded Warriors barracks. At the next executive meeting we need to focus on the Memorial Day Ceremony coming up in May, We need to start planning that, guest speaker and all.

We also have a new van, a 2008 Chevy express, which was donated to us by a combination of people. Mr. Pearson, a retired dental tech donated his wife's car to us as a down payment on the van that National Dodge had, Harry Brown of National Dodge helped us by knocking a couple thousand off of the price and the Cape Hatteras vacation fund donated another \$2500 to make it a reality. Letter to the editor Let's talk PTSD
2012: Military suicides outnumber combat deaths - Economy and leadership to blame By ROBERT

LAURIE - There's a good chance that this is the most depressing statistic you'll see all year According to a new Army report, as of November, 303 active-duty, Reserve and National Guard soldiers had committed suicide in 2012. During the same period, 212 men and women in uniform were lost due to combat fatalities in Afghanistan. Back in June, the number of suicides stood at 154 - roughly half of the current total.

Secretary of Defense Leon Panetta acknowledged the problem and blamed society at large. "We're dealing with broader societal issues," he said. "Substance abuse, financial distress and relationship problems -the risk factors for suicide also reflect problems that will endure beyond war.

What are the signs of PTSD?

"Driving down the roads in my home town, I found myself noticing every piece of debris, avoiding every pothole."

A wide variety of symptoms may be signs you are experiencing PTSD: Feeling upset by things that remind you of what happened

Having <u>nightmares</u>, vivid memories, or <u>flashbacks</u> of the event that make you feel like it's happening all over again Feeling emotionally cut off from others Feeling numb or <u>losing interest</u> in things you used to care about

Becoming depressed

Thinking that you are always in danger Feeling anxious, jittery, or irritated Experiencing a sense of panic that something bad is about to happen Having difficulty sleeping Having trouble keeping your mind on one thing

Having a hard time relating to and getting along with your spouse, family, or friends

"When stress brought on flashbacks, I dealt with them by drinking them away. I considered it recreational drinking, but really I was self-medicating."

It's not just the symptoms of PTSD but also how you may react to them that can disrupt your life. You may:

Frequently avoid places or things that remind you of what happened Consistent drinking or use of drugs to numb your feelings

<u>Consider harming yourself</u> or others

Start working all the time to occupy your mind

Pull away from other people and become isolated

Keep in mind that you do not need to have all the symptoms to have severe or mild PTSD. We write about this quite often within the chapter because we feel that it is highly important. Being combat wounded we all have PTSD to varying degrees, depending on what we experienced and our psychological makeup.

Let me say first that all of us older members of the chapter know that we do have PTSD. I have talked with some of you younger members that don't realize that they do have it. Some of us older guys are still going to controlled sessions and others of us are merely coping with it on our own terms and/or prescribed medication. You probably have heard some of us joke about emailing at 0300 in the morning due to a PTSD night. That happens quite often and we never know what will set it off. It could be a Movie on TV or an event that we attended such as a Memorial Service. One of mine recently was the evening of Patriot Kneisley's (recently deceased) viewing up at 0230 unable to get back to sleep.

Some of you may say that we talk about this too much. Last year we had one of our chapter members commit suicide, he was in GA and lost his support network. Those in the Wounded Warrior Barracks with him know who he was. Maybe had we talked about it more he would still be with us, who knows? It's an extremely important issue as you

can see by the statistics at the beginning of this newsletter. To me it's hard to fathom an entire rifle company gone to suicide, an entire rifle company and the Army is worse than that.

Patriots, one of the worse things in life is to haunt your family by taking your own life. It is a stigma that they will never get over, they constantly are questioning, what could I have done differently? In the case of a breakup, marriage or girlfriend, they are torn with, if I had just not told him about it! They will have to live with this for the rest of their lives please do not put them through this. If you have considered harming yourself there is help out there and more coming on board every day.

Not everyone with PTSD will consider suicide, don't get me wrong. In many instances it is a mitigating factor and the more that we are aware of it the better off we are.

The officers of this chapter have talked to many members about PTSD, I will probably get a response or two back from this from someone that I have talked with in the past. I like to think that we have helped some out with their PTSD. Anytime, any one of us can help you don't hesitate to call on us, every single one of you are important to us. God Bless and Semper Fi, John

USMC MEBs Overhauled

Corps plans middleweight force for crisis response

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. — The
slowing pace of deployments to
Afghanistan and resurgence in unit
rotations to Asia-Pacific is helping
to shape Marine expeditionary
brigades, which the Marine Corps
is counting on as its go-to crisisresponse forces.

The MEB, as an entity, has had a yo-yo life in the Marine Corps, mostly existing as a headquarters element that organized forces to respond to a crisis or contingency. Most Marines probably didn't know it existed or what it was about.

But in the past year, the service has reinvigorated its three active-duty MEBs, formally standing up headquarters in Japan, North Carolina and California under their respective Marine expeditionary forces. Each MEB will deploy and lead Marines when the MEF commander gets the order to respond to a crisis.

The aim is to develop the MEB as a "middleweight" option between the Corps' smaller Marine expeditionary units and its larger MEFs. The force, which can range from 2,500 to 15,000 Marines, can include a mix of ground combat, combat logistics and aviation units, adjusted to a specific mission.

"We train ... very deliberately, progressively [and] cohesively, he said. "We've identified the force list that's [associated] with the MEB. It [then] becomes a bit of a menu, and we go in and pick from that. We know who those units are. We know [each] unit's level of readiness." The MEBs "train to a wide variety missions, predominantly at the high end," he said, "so it enables us to train across the range of military operations." On the East Coast, the 2nd MEB at Camp Lejeune, N.C., which stood up in November, will draw forces from ground, aviation and logistics units within II MEF, but no specific unit is permanently assigned.

"If there was a crisis that required a [MEB] response ... we would select units that would be task-organized to respond to that crisis," said Capt. Binford Strickland, a II MEF spokesman. Meanwhile, 2nd MEB, commanded by Brig. Gen. John Love, continues to develop, train and work toward being fully operational by 2015.

Identity problem

MEBs are often misunderstood, commanders say.

"If someone were to ask us what a MEB is, part of our answer [would be]: 'What do you want it to be?' It can be anything that it needs to be," Spiese said. "That's the beauty of how we build our task forces inside the Marine airground task force." MEBs have earned accolades in pivotal operations, including the 1991 Persian Gulf War, the 1992 landing in Somalia for Operation Restore Hope, the 2001 assault into Afghanistan and the 2003 Iraq invasion.

While each mission was different, "they were all centered around MEB-styled formations and MEB-styled operations," he said. "So it's proven to be adaptable."

The biggest challenge may be getting Marines, accustomed to 10 years of combat rotations, to think and train as part of a MEB.

The deployable MEB

Getting the crisis-response force where it's needed is another matter. One option is to offload vehicles, equipment and supplies ashore from prepositioned cargo ships. The second is for the MEB to deploy on ships, like a MEU.

Getting those sea legs honed is a big mission for each MEB. "We really haven't been able to focus on those core competencies because of the rotations into Afghanistan," Broadmeadow said.

Marine Corps and Navy units will go to sea for the large bluegreen

exercises Dawn Blitz in California and Bold Alligator off Virginia to learn and sharpen those skills. The ultimate goal, Spiese said, is for a MEB to "be able to move, not quite on autopilot, but very smoothly and efficiently in responding to a crisis."

"We are probably further ahead than any tactical unit in the U.S. in that regard," he said. If a crisis arises, "we want to be in a position that, if it's bad, we're not guessing, we are moving efficiently and effectively."

The Purple Heart riders were formed about two years ago by a Chapter in New Hampshire. The organization was formed by Motor Cycle enthusiasts that wanted to have a riding group within the Purple Heart. They first went to the MOPH and requested to use the circular logo owned by the Order and were told that they could not use it and furthermore if it was

worn as a group it would signify Purple Heart sponsorship and therefore liability. which they would not accept.

With that knowledge obtained from National, the New Hampshire chapter set out to establish a Purple Heart riding group with our own constitution and bylaws and in no way part of the Purple Heart Order other than the members must have a Purple Heart. There are Purple Heart Riders now in 38 states and the patch worn on the back of a black denim or leather vest is awesome and in my estimation far better looking that the Purple Heart logo.
